- I like to tell people not to be afraid of semicolons; they aren't scary when you know how to use them.
- Try color-coding your paragraphs to make sure you include all necessary parts. For example, you could make your topic sentence green, evidence red, and explanations blue, so you know how much of each you have.

We will work with you at any stage of your writing process, from understanding your purpose and brainstorming ideas to discovering revision strategies. Our work includes help with:

The Writing Center conducts in-person and online sessions.

Central students, staff, and faculty are able to schedule appointments through our regular scheduling software, called WCONLINE: https://ccsu.mywconline.com/. We also accept walk-ins.



Instructors: request a class visit!

Most sessions take place for 30 minutes, but you may make an appointment for 15, 30, 45, or 60 minutes. If you are not sure about session length, give us a call or stop by!

In each session, we offer conversation, questions, feedback, and strategies to help you improve your writing. We recommend that you visit us more than once as you work through drafts of your writing.


BOOK CLUB SELECTION



How does it work?

Parallel Writing is a productivity technique that involves working on tasks with another person as an accountability partner, whether online or in-person. Book quiet writing time to work in the Writing Center by visiting ccsu.mywconline.com. A tutor will work next to you. At the beginning of the appointment, the tutor will help you set a manageable goal for your session. In the final few minutes of the appointment, you will touch base about your progress with the tutor, who will then record it in your tutor report and send it to you via email. Parallel Writing is also good for longer projects like capstones to break into manageable chunks.


Why Does this work?




